Principal's Message

Welcome back, I hope you had a great summer. We would like to welcome back Vanessa Viner to a new Math and Healthy Living position. In addition, Chauncey Hill and Marketa Glenn have joined our Educational Assistant staff.

There have been many changes to the main office staff. I am currently Acting Principal while Mr. Stokes is away. Mr. Veinotte is currently in the position of Grade 9 VP for Mr. Bennett. Mrs. Green is also in the office to help with my former position. School enrollment also created a drop in our number of administrative assistants in the main office. Please be patient as we begin the year with many new changes and various new faces in the office.

Each year we always review the policies and procedures from the AVRSB, this year we continue to plan to focus on the new Code of Conduct developed by the Minister of Education. As parents it is important to get involved in the trends our society dictates, one big one is cyberbullying. We will continue to use the same approach with cyberbullying as we did in previous years. Inappropriate behaviors associated with social media will be dealt with through the new code of conduct; there is no tolerance for this type of behavior and our students know that. Encourage your daughter/son to stay away from using social media to intimidate others or getting involved in drama, these behaviors create unnecessary stress in all of our lives.

Good attendance and punctuality are positive behaviors that we promote at Horton High School. Data shows that some students are missing too much class time. Please call or email the school through the attendance link if they are going to be absent from classes. This needs to be a focus when they have a scheduled assessment on the day of their absence. The province is now in the process of developing an attendance policy to help promote school attendance and enhance student performance. This new policy could be reality at any time. In addition, I believe that being late to class is disruptive to all, but often not always avoidable. If your son or daughter is going to be late for school, please alert the office prior to their arrival or just bring your son or daughter into the school to sign in. I would also like to remind parents that students are required to be signed out when leaving school early. If the system we have in place is followed, this prevents unnecessary phone calls, texts and emails to you about student attendance

Demographic forms have been sent home recently and it is important that we get them returned ASAP with updated data. Please pay close attention to student self-identification, email contacts, cell phone numbers and emergency contact information. If there is an incident involving your son or daughter we need various ways to get in touch with the immediate family or emergency contacts.

Please refer to the many other forms that have been sent home for your signature, it is important to get those in as soon as possible. We recently rolled out our chromebooks to students to use throughout the year. It was released to our students if your son/daughter brought back the signed form. Students will be responsible for the care of their chromebook and will have to maintain it until they graduate, meaning a student in grade 9 will be given the same device next year. If you have any questions on the use of chromebooks, please drop me a message and I will be eager to help.

To close, I would quickly like to mention the use of technology in the classroom. The issue of cell phone and chromebook use in the classroom can be very distracting to both student and teacher. These devices are permitted to be used only at times when the teacher allows them to use this technology. These devices can be useful educational tools when used properly. Students who do not follow the rules of the classroom will be referred to school administration.
